Vosotros/ Vosotras

Vosotros/as = you all

*Used in Spain for addressing a group informally

*Not used in Lan America

*Vosotros = group of all male or a mixed group of people.

*Vosotras = group of all female

Ustedes (Uds.)

Uds. = you all

*Used in Spain for addressing a group formally

*Used in Lan America, for both formal and informal situaons
